This week I read a report that people in Britain are more scared of the coronavirus than in any other country 'because they care more about their fellow citizens', an international study has found. 'The national stereotype is that British people are fairly reserved, but when something goes on people seem very willing to step in and do the right thing'. We do live in a lovely caring community and I thought Stu's article in the Crossing magazine said it so well. But we have also seen a wonderful response in other parts of the country through churches and through charities meeting the needs of those really struggling in the crisis. The Thursday evening 'clap for carers' epitomises this spirit.
