SUNDAY'S READINGS: ISAIAH 25:1-9; PSALM 23; PHILIPPIANS 4:1-9; MATTHEW 22:1-14

There were servants whose job it was just to look after these huge wardrobes to be ready for such occasions. Then the king would inspect his guests before the festivities began. And in this story one guest prefers to wear his own clothes than accept the king's. God's invitation is to each of us, old and young, rich and poor. But we have to be willing to let him reclothe us in his robes of righteousness and that means we have to be willing to change.
